As a company we try to minimize our plastic use, of course some things can be hard to change, but we are constantly watching new ideas, and how we may be able to incorporate them. Reusable bags instead of plastic, paper straws instead of plastic paper bags, where you can, or a reusable keepcup, have your own water bottle, dispose of your rubbish, don't chuck it anywhere, it will end up in the ocean, and then in a sea creature.

Oh that is hard...... Growing up I had dolphin everything, every birthday/Christmas I got something Dolphin, because you know I would love it! They are an amazing creature, so intelligent, and so beautiful.
