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What does a day working at the reef look like for you? Blue crystal clear waters, amazing coral formations of multiple colours, hundreds of marine organisms of varied shapes and sizes that move and interact in incredible ways.

What is your favourite part about working at the reef?

Having the best office in the world and being able to share with people the magical experience of seeing this bio-diverse ecosystem first hand. My favourite part of all of this is making visitors understand the relevance of the reef and the risks that it is facing with global warming, pollution and human influence.

In your opinion, what is the state of the reef?

The reef is still alive, and it is still bio-diverse, but the bleaching events in 2016 and 2017 affected it's health significantly.

What questions do people always ask you about the reef? Is the reef going to survive? How has your experience been diving in the reef while the bleaching was going on?

What can people do to help preserve and protect the reef? Get involved into politics and make politicians understand that we care about their environmental policies and that their stands on these issues can affect the way we choose who governs. Small things like recycling, not using plastic bags, etc... can also help the reef.

What is your favourite reef critter? Nudibrances and octopuses.
